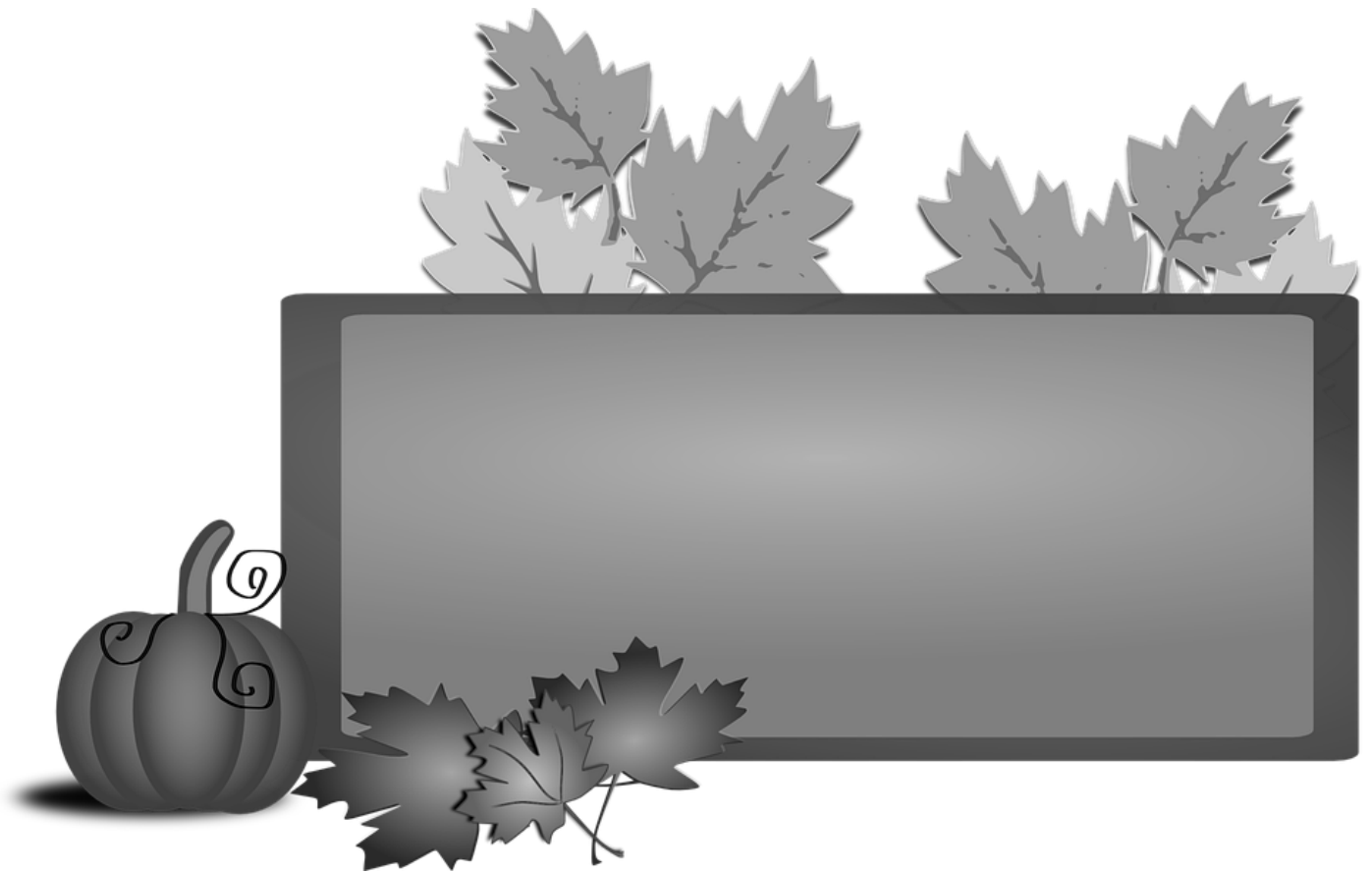

Dear Friends,

People have an innate desire to have control over their lives, their environment, and the outcomes of their actions. We want everything to go the way we want it to, to shape outcomes and events to our liking. Human beings fear losing control.

I read an illustration recently about the Holy Spirit. A tutor sat at a desk, by a window. The desk was neatly arranged with stacks of papers. As he spoke of the working of the Holy Spirit, he opened the window. The wind whipped in and sent the papers flying. As Jesus explained in his conversation with Nicodemus, the Spirit moves freely as God wills and those who accept the Spirit will also follow wherever they are led. So, what does that mean for us as believers, are we willing to give up being in control? When we let the Holy Spirit lead and guide us in our lives and mission, things will look very different - our expectations and the familiar comforting norms that we've established may or will be challenged.

Since the lock-down many churches haven't returned to the old patterns and ways, God had and still has new things, new ways for us to be church. We can be reluctant or even against change especially where it seems to undermine the familiar and we want to take control, holding on to what we know rather than letting God rule in our lives and church - we fear losing control.

You may have heard the words of Richard Rohr, a Franciscan friar who said this, "The opposite of faith isn't doubt; the opposite of faith is control." The challenge of God's will, the challenge of God's free and transforming Spirit is to let go and let God, wherever that may lead us. So, let's choose faith over control and learn to live fully under God's will, allowing the Holy Spirit to work God's purposes in us and through us.

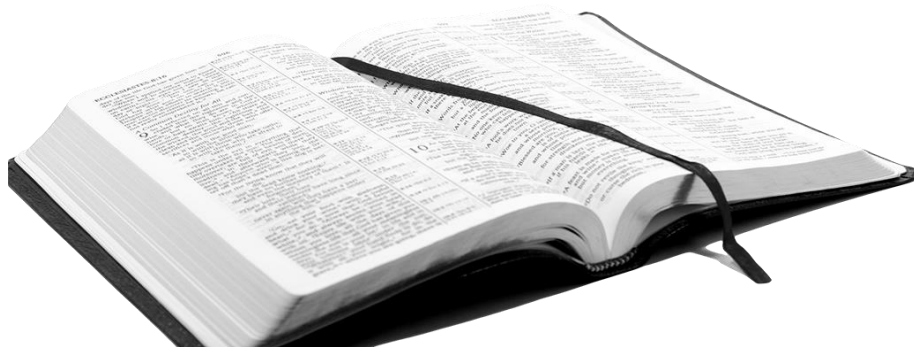

RECIPE - OCTOBER: Uncooked Chocolate Cake.

4oz bar of plain chocolate, grated.

4oz digestive biscuits, broken into pieces (but not crushed)

4oz butter or margarine

$\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon vanilla essence

1 dessert-spoon caster sugar

- 1 Melt grated chocolate in a basin over a pan of hot water ,and stir until melted.
- 2 In another basin, cream together the fat, sugar, vanilla essence, and mix well.
- 3 Add digestive biscuits and melted chocolate.
- 4 Beat until well mixed.
- 5 Press the mixture into a well greased sandwich tin then leave in fridge for 2 hours before cutting into thin slices.

GARDENING NOTES - OCTOBER:

- 1 Collect any frost-sensitive container plants, stand in a sheltered place and cover with fleece; or place in a greenhouse.
- 2 Plant tubs and containers with dwarf conifers, ivy, heathers and other hardy dwarf shrubs.
- 3 Transplant hardy plants growing in containers out into beds.
- 4 Prepare the greenhouse for the winter.
- 5 Aerate and scarify lawns, and treat with Autumn fertiliser.
- 6 Continue to spray roses against greenfly and fungus diseases.

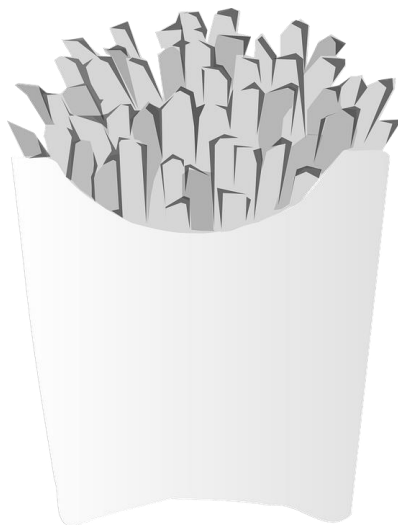
The last month at Whetstone has definitely been a month of food and celebrations!
