When I felt called to train for Ministry, I was sure God had got it wrong or I should say, that I'd got it wrong. I felt I didn't have the gifts to be an Ordained Minister, I wasn't the most confident person to say the least. But, during the long and testing call process I was told that no two Minister's are alike, each has their own gifts to use in God's service. It was during that time that I read a book actually entitled, 'Called to be me.' And that is it precisely, I'm not called to be a Minister like Martin, Les, Richard, Ivor or any other Minister, I'm called to be me.

I was reading a book recently and I found another illustration about Christ given gifts. This one is about keys. A bunch of keys represents much of our lives and our circle of friends and acquaintances. A car key is used in the lock of a car, a house key represents the lock of the door to our home. You might even have a sport's locker key, which implies that you have a gym membership. Perhaps you have keys for the place you work or even to your church building! No matter our age, very early on keys become an important part of our lives. We can look at keys negatively because we are securing our possessions against being stolen. However, keys can remind us of the daily parts of our lives where we can share Jesus.

Each lock and key are carefully chosen by a locksmith. If you take a key to be cut, the locksmith will choose the right type of key. Each key has the manufacturer's name and each type of key has it's own depth and shape and code and name. Jesus called each of his disciples by name, knowing all about them and choosing them carefully. He knew the right person for the right job. Jesus also calls us by name. He knows us intimately, with our strengths and weaknesses, whatever they may be. The key that the locksmith chooses for the lock is blank to start with. He/she then uses tools to shape it carefully so that it fits the lock perfectly. Just like the key, we are 'shaped' by Jesus through our understanding of the Bible, our experiences, by the church we attend and the people around us. Jesus shapes us carefully to fit the place or places where we can minister best for him and that place is in our daily lives, the church, the community, school or work etc. The locksmith doesn't make a key to fit just anywhere. He makes a key for a particular lock and purpose.

We can be confident therefore, that where Jesus calls us to be witnesses for him, we don't need to be afraid that we go unprepared. Instead, we can have confidence that, just as a locksmith prepares a key for a specific lock, so Jesus has prepared us for the ministries, situations in which we find ourselves, to bring hope, to bring love and hope to the people Jesus has compassion for.

RECIPE - MAY: CHOCOLATE & ORANGE MOUSSE (serves 4)

6 ozs plain chocolate, broken into pieces

Juice of 1 large orange

4 eggs, separated

To decorate:

$\frac{1}{4}$ pint double or whipping cream

Finely grated rind of 1 orange

2 teaspoons orange juice

1 - 2 ozs plain chocolate, grated

- 1) Place chocolate in a heatproof bowl standing over a pan of gently simmering water.
- 2) Heat gently until chocolate has melted, stirring occasionally with a wooden spoon.
- 3) Remove the bowl from the heat, leave to cool slightly, then gradually stir in the egg yolks.
- 4) Leave until cold, stirring occasionally.
- 5) Beat the egg whites until stiff, then fold into the egg yolk mixture until evenly blended.
- 6) Spoon the mousse into 4 individual glasses or dishes, then chill in the refrigerator for 4 hours.

To decorate:

- 1) Put cream, orange rind and juice in a bowl, and whip together until the cream holds its shape.
- 2) Pipe 1 rosette of cream on top of each mousse, then sprinkle with grated chocolate.
- 3) Serve chilled.

GARDENING TIPS - MAY.

- 1) Give new plants a good watering, and lay mulch.
- 2) Plant out chrysanthemums and dahlias.
- 3) Divide water lilies.
- 4) Mow the lawn on a weekly to fortnightly basis, and feed as necessary.
- 5) Sow perennial seeds, and finish the outdoor sowing of annuals.
- 6) Cut back shrubs once they have finished flowering.

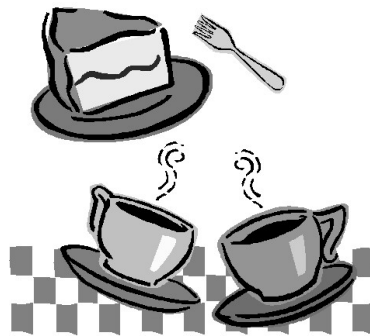
