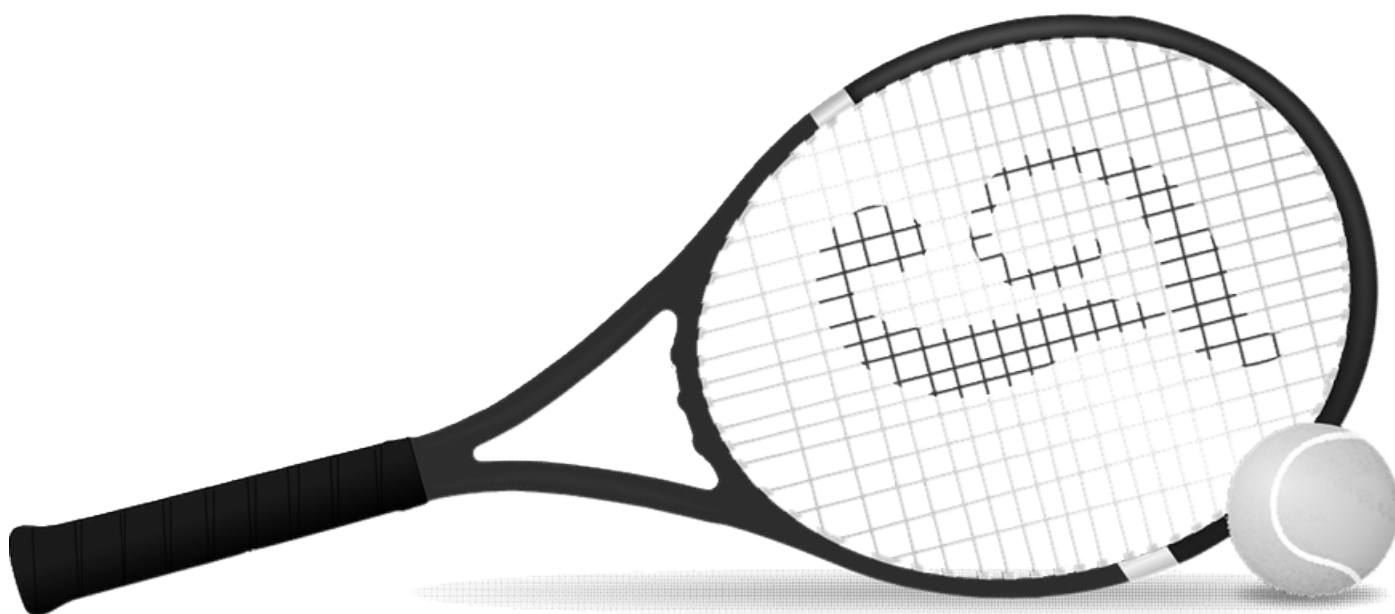

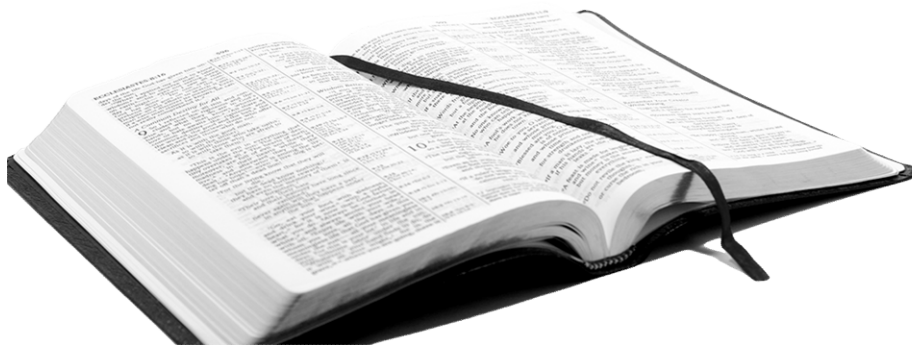

Easter at Long Street

Palm Sunday - April 13th 2025

Our Palm Sunday service was led by Revd David Howlett and included traditional and familiar hymns and readings telling the story of the events leading up to Good Friday. The prayers echoed this as David prayed for hope and peace in so many countries around the world and for governments everywhere making compassionate and peaceful offers of help. The service ended with Charles Williams giving out the Palm Sunday crosses to all the congregation for them to take home. Then, after hot drinks and cakes, folk were able to walk to Bell Street where a short outdoor service was held as part of our annual Palm Sunday witness.

RECIPE - JUNE: FRUIT FLAPJACKS (Makes 24)

6 ozs butter
2 ozs demerara sugar
3 ozs golden syrup
8 ozs rolled oats
3 ozs dried apricots, chopped
3 ozs stoned dates, chopped
3 ozs stoned prunes, chopped

1. Pre-heat oven to 200 C/400 F/Gas 6, then butter a shallow tin (about 11" x 7").
2. Put butter, sugar and syrup into a large saucepan, stirring continuously over a moderate heat until melted.
3. Stir the oats into the melted mixture, spread half over base of the tin to form a thin layer, then press with the back of a spoon to firm and smooth.
4. In a bowl, mix together the chopped apricots, dates and prunes.
5. Sprinkle evenly over the oat mixture, then spread the remaining oat mixture on top of the fruits; press with the spoon until firm and smooth.
6. Bake for 20 - 25 minutes until lightly browned.
7. Allow to cool for 5 minutes, then mark and cut into 24 squares.
8. Leave in tin until completely cold, lift out with a small palette knife.



GARDENING NOTES - JUNE

- 1) Plant the last of the annuals.
- 2) Harvest herbs and early potatoes.
- 3) Tie up tomatoes and pinch out side shoots regularly.
- 4) At the end of the month trim topiary and hedges.
- 5) Check garden lighting in preparation for warm evenings outdoors.
- 6) Remove tulips that have finished flowering, carefully dig up the bulbs, remove excess soil, and store them in a cool, dry place until autumn.

When we totalled everything up we had raised £181.15 which is our best amount for a coffee morning.

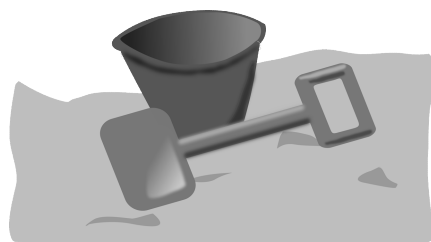

'Tis better we commence at home, and from that point begin.

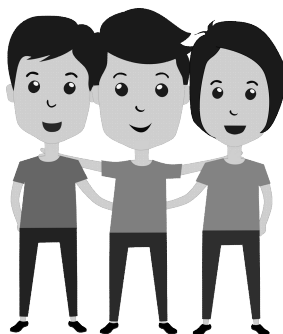
We have no right to judge a man, until he's fairly tried;
